

To help us to promote a love of reading with children in school, we are planning several exciting reading initiatives to tie in with world book day.




#### World Book Day—3rd March


## Sponsored Read & Extreme Reading Challenge

## Phonics at Christ Church School

Following an update from the DfE around phonics teaching, and in line with our school improvement plan, as a school we have moved to 'Essential Letters & Sounds' (ELS) systematic, synthetic programme (SSP) for teaching phonics in Reception and Year 1. Children in these classes have received a letter giving further details of our phonics programme. We will be holding a meeting in school for Reception and Year 1 parents on Tuesday 22nd February at 6pm to further explain how we teach reading in our school. Please do try to attend this meeting if you have a child in these classes.

### Music Tuition

We are working closely with Lancashire Music service to provide extended opportunities for additional instrument tuition. Over the last term we have been working hard with Ormskirk Music Centre and Chris Cull to develop opportunities and he will lead this music tuition.

On *Monday 21<sup>st</sup> February*, we will be having a special assembly in school when Chris will tell all the children about the different instruments they may wish to learn. Following this special assembly, the children will bring letters home detailing the instruments available and prices for lessons.

Then on *Monday 28<sup>th</sup> February* there will be an after-school session from *3:30-5:00pm* for parents to come and discuss the instruments with your children and actually try them out. At his evening you will be able to talk to the music teachers and sign up for instrument tuition should you wish. Please put this date in your diary.

#### **Online Safety**

Online safety also plays an important part in keeping all children safe and supports their well being. This week we had special assemblies to talk to the children about the importance of respect on line and remaining safe. This was followed up with class actives. #### Update on Covid-19 - Isolation and Testing

As a school we continue to have measures in place for the safety of our whole community. Upon our initial return to school in January we maintained a bubble structure in school to allow us to review cases and our school and community context.

Last Monday we removed our bubble structure and have monitored school carefully this week. School has functioned really well and we have once again come together in the hall for whole school worship. We will continue to keep our measures and school context under daily review to ensure the most appropriate measures for our setting are in place.

Also, in line with Government guidance, from January 11th, people testing asymptotically do not need to book a PCR test if they have a positive LFD result. They can just start their isolation from the day of their positive LFD test. People who are symptomatic should still book a PCR test.

From **Monday 17th January**, people who are self-isolating with COVID-19 now have the option to reduce their isolation period after 5 full days if they test negative with a lateral flow device (LFD) test on both day 5 and day 6 and they do not have a temperature. For example, **if they test negative on the morning of day 5 and the morning of day 6, they can return to their education or childcare setting immediately on day 6.** 

The first test must be taken no earlier than day 5 of the self-isolation period, and the second must be taken the following day. All test results should be reported to NHS Test and Trace.

If the result of either of their tests is positive, they should continue to self-isolate until they get negative results from two LFD tests on consecutive days or until they have completed 10 full days of self-isolation, whichever is earliest.
